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Electronic Resources

The Harare Institute of Technology Library is making tremendous efforts to debunk this myth and attempt to make use of social media technology for scientific and scholarly research, as well as platforms for communicating and sharing innovation and scholarly output. Malik Aleem Ahmed thought along the same lines when he correctly observed that "Higher education institutions in developed countries have started using social media for the provision of quality education and the production of valuable research." (Ahmed 2011). This means that if higher education institutions in developing countries do not hook on to SMT now, they will definite leg behind. Understandably, issues to do with Internet connectivity in the face of incessant power outages as well as the high costs of Internet access may preclude many such institutions in developing countries to make optimum use of the social media technologies. However, efforts should be made to promote and increase awareness and acceptance of the myriad of possibilities and benefits accrual to academics and researchers alike through the use of social media technology.

What is Social Media Technology (SMT)?

Andreas Kaplan and Michael Haenlein defined social media technology as "A group of Internet-based applications that build on the ideological and technological foundations of Web 2.0 which allows the creation and exchange of user-generated content" (In Wikipedia, Accessed 01/06/11). As highlighted in the last segment of this definition, the HIT Library intends to debunk the social networkuse-only myth and show that this technology can be used to create and share usergenerated content by scientists, scholars and academics at HIT.

SMT uses readily and easily accessible communication technologies using asynchronous and synchronous communication processes that is, reaching large audiences from a single source to many, or from many sources to many audiences, and from many sources to a single user. SMT is highly scalable. It can disseminate and share scientific and scholarly research to a very wide audience over great distances simultaneously. It would thus take a short time for one's research to be accessed, read and used by millions of users through the social media technology making the research an instant success story.

The social media also makes use of webbased and mobile technologies which provide for greatly enhanced and highly interactive communication process. This permits a researcher to get immediate feedback from a user or groups of users including experts and eminent researchers in one's field regarding the shared research findings. The immediate feedback provides for instant recognition of contributions made in the field of study hence the rise to prominence of the contributing researcher (s). The blended use of technology and the enhanced capability of interaction both contribute towards unlocking stakeholder value in social media technology.

Advantages of Social Media

Compared to the printed media such as newspapers as well television and radio, social media technologies have advantages that outweigh the former. The following are some of the advantages worth noting:

Social media technologies have the capability of wide coverage and reaches very large audiences easily since they are Internet and webbased. The social media tools use extensive communication technologies such as fibreoptic cabling, Wireless or radio technologies, ordinary twisted-pair cabling, or very small and very-wide aperture satellite (VSAT and WSAT) communication technologies that reach corners of the world in seconds.

Ease of access - The social media technologies are also readily and easily available to the general public at almost no cost except for the initial investment in the procurement and installation of a computer, laptop, palm-top, notebook, or mobile phone and connecting to the Internet.

No real demand for specialized skills training and knowledge - For one to be able to start producing material for publication on social media, one does not require specialized skills training and knowledge. These normally require an improvement or build up on the existing Internet use skills for one to be able to produce and share materials on any of the social media platforms.

Instant communication - Communication using social media tools is almost instantaneous. Response from audiences on posted issues is received as soon as it hits the Web.

Instant editing and commenting on errors -

This gives social media the added advantage of effecting changes wherever and whenever these are required.

EXPLORING and IMPLEMENTING SUBJECT LIBRARIANSHIP IN HIT

Introduction

A subject librarian is a library staff member who has been formally assigned to be the primary contact person or liaison person between the Library and a particular academic group (s) (i.e. faculty, department, college, school, centre or program).

Subject librarians work with academic departments to identify and address the library and information needs of staff and students in particular discipline areas. They typically provide user education sessions that are specifically tailored to the needs of assigned departments, manage the library's subject collections for that department, ensures relevance, currency of information sources, authoritative, and help users at all levels to make effective use of library resources. In some institutions the subject librarian may be a 'one-stop-shopkeper' for the academic units on any library issue with minimum referrals.

Subject librarianship is indeed a strategic service in which the subject librarian acts as a point of contact between the library and faculty. In the HIT LIS, this strategy enables the Library to effectively promote user-focused service provision by promoting a more detailed awareness of user needs through the subject librarian. The strategy also ensures that the library collections are balanced and are also in line with the interests of the users. Acquisition of library materials, for example, should be done by a team of subject librarians with different backgrounds in order to ensure a balanced collection. Even in weeding unused materials from the library, subject librarianship assures that this exercise is undertaken in a systematic manner. Baker and Smith (1994) observed that in the UK weeding of books is done by subject librarians as uninformed weeding could lead to a loss of unique and useful materials.

Designations of Subject Librarians

Many institutions of higher learning in the global village have different designations or titles for subject librarians. They are known as faculty librarians, school librarians in institutions that have schools and/or with faculties, subject consultants, subject support officers, subject specialists, academic librarians, liaison librarians, academic liaison officers, link librarians, information librarians, information specialist, or subject librarians.

According to Martin (1996), the majority of librarians in Britain prefer to be known as either a "liaison librarian" or a "subject librarian". They believe that a subject specialist denotes that one has serious subject knowledge and qualifications, whereas a subject librarian is a professional librarian who happens to look after a particular subject. Nearer home the University of Botswana Library (UBL) refers them as subject librarians or library liaison (Martin, 1996). The HIT Library has settled for the term Subject Librarian.

Objectives

The following are some of the identified objec-

tives for subject librarianship at HIT:

• To be the library link and focal-point persons for both students and members of staff;

• To develop, in liaison with faculty, and maintain the subject collection in the library;

• To provide subject-oriented library instruction and information literacy skills training to students and faculty members;

• To promote and provide reference and referral information services to all library patrons;

• To direct staff and students to other useful sources of information other than those found in the HIT Library; and

• To cultivate commitment to innovative customer care, effective public relations and deliver professional services grounded in fairness, equity and honesty within and outside the library.

Role of the Subject Librarian at HIT

The Subject Librarian at HIT Library shall engage in activities related to the development of the library collection, including the determination, coordination and implementation of the selection policy; assisting faculty members in selecting library materials through the circulation of print and online subject catalogues; collection maintenance and weeding; assessment of user needs with the specific view to build a relevant collection;, undertaking collection use studies to determine usage patterns; and to carry out collection evaluation to assess relevance and appropriateness. These activities highlight why collection development is the heart of subject librarianship in any institution. The Subject Librarian at HIT must know the particular strengths of the library collections and selects the appropriate library materials that support the teaching, learning, and research needs of a particular faculty or department and students.

The Subject Librarians and the faculty must jointly collaborate and participate actively in book selection. The responsibility of the teaching staff is to keep the collection in their respective subject fields alive and to fill existing gaps. Faculty must respond to requests by Subject Librarians to submit lists of core texts and/or additional recommended bibliography for purchase to ensure a well-rounded subject collection development.

In a rapidly changing information environment, it is increasingly necessary to keep users abreast with newer, readily available and easily accessible information resources. Different subject communities are currently contributing to and making use of electronic library services. Subject librarians are better placed to see how the electronic library service can best fit with subject user groups. They can vigorously advocate for the use of the new electronic library materials and even help in showing how these can be used in teaching, learning and research activities. Case studies and sample electronic materials can be identified which can be made available to academic staff for use in their teaching activities. This way, the Subject Librarian is therefore able to participate actively in the learning and teaching process at HIT.

Roles of HIT Subject Librarians

Subject Librarians at HIT will provide specialized reference service to students and faculty in their subject fields and are particularly adept at determining user needs. Their involvement with departments increases librarians' awareness of past, ongoing and future research among faculty members. This information is then used to match the expressed and potential or unexpressed needs with the existing library collections thereby enabling the Subject Librarians to provide effective reference and referral services.

Subject Librarians at HIT are involved in liaison activities especially in establishing and promoting liaison relationships for interdepartmental cooperation. Liaison denotes cooperation, collaboration, and partnership between the subject librarian and the faculty in order to enhance teaching, learning and research activities. This enables the HIT Library to reach out and work closely with faculty rather than to be seen as an independent and isolated ivory tower to which users only go to as a one-way information seeking process.

Apart from developing and fostering direct and effective communication Subject Librarians also provide good public relations inside and outside the library and are taking the library right to the doorsteps of the schools and departments

The HIT subject librarian is expected to monitor and evaluate developments in subject areas they have been assigned to look after and to alert members of current developments in their respective fields.

HIT Subject Librarians also have the primary responsibility for the selection eresources for purchase and inclusion in the library collection. Information is now available in different formats such as e-books, CD-ROM, online journals and databases. The liaison role of the Subject Librarians ensures that the selection of e-resources is done in accordance with the general collection development policy (CDP) of the HIT Library. Currently, the HIT Library is subscribing to online resources through various International support initiatives; the International Network for the Availability of Scientific Publications (INASP) and the Electronic information For Libraries (eiFL). INASP provides access to electronic journal literature for scientific and scholarly research through the Programme for the Enhancement of Research Initiatives (PERii) while eiFL provides free open access to research information through consortia participation. The HIT Library has recently taken up subscription to e-Brary which is providing access to more than 30000 digital books on the web. The Subject Librarian at HIT has a critical responsibility to ensure that all these electronic resources are therefore

extensively used to stimulate scholarship in innovation. The growing and valuable resource base will make the HIT Library realise its vision of being the ultimate knowledge and information focal-point and assures stakeholders one-stop shopping for information.

Information literacy skills (ILS) training is becoming an increasingly important element of the subject librarian's role. At HIT Library, this role entails inculcating in faculty members and students research and information searching and use skills. The importance of subject librarians as teachers is also gradually being acknowledged. In addition to imparting bibliographic skills to students and staff. Subject Librarians teach users how to search for quality information on the Internet using a variety of search engines as well as subject directories and subject gateways. ILS training equips users with skills to search, locate and use knowledge and information for their project research work, for assignment writings, and for study and learning activities.

Benefits of Subject Librarianship at HIT

1. Subject librarianship achieves a more efficient liaison between the library and the faculties. Through this scheme, there is a constant flow of ideas between librarians and the faculty (lecturers). The problems of the faculty are carried to the libraries for effective solutions, whilst those of the library are sympathetically listened to by members of the faculty. This builds mutually beneficial and harmonious relationships between the HIT Library, faculty and students.

2. The most logical approach to collection development appears to be by subject approach. Subject Librarians, in liaison with faculty, are able to build relevant and appropriate information resource collections because they have the assistance of faculty and they utilise their subject knowledge and bibliographic skills to achieve this goal.

3. Another important aspect of collection development is stock revision. A decision is made on which books should be bound, which should be replaced with new editions, which ones to retire from active service or for 'discarding?' (donating to others who may find them useful?). A subject librarian is in a better position to know what books are relevant and can meaningfully effect stock revision in consultation with the relevant departments.

4. Subject librarianship facilitates the efficient use of professional staff and maximizes the utilization of staff expertise and qualities. It ensures that professional librarians do not spend a great deal of their time performing routine tasks that could be handled by non-professionals.

A subject librarian is more likely to provide an efficient reference and bibliographic service because he or she is aware of the research interests of members of his faculty and can offer personalized services. Efficient bibliographic help could be given to teaching and research staff because the subject librarian is familiar with his subject and greater client satisfaction can be achieved. This fosters a crucial symbiotic relationship between user, materials and specially trained staff.

Challenges with Subject Librarianship

According to Martin (1996), the major problem of subject librarianship is that there is always poor job definition or specification and performances are very often inadequate. Thus at HIT, there would be need in the near future to adequately define the job description and person specification of Subject Librarians in order to recruit personnel who would be specifically engaged and geared to implement this important strategic service. Currently the service is at its inception in the HIT Library and is being performed by all library staff. Professional staffs are being used as the main executors of the service while junior staff are being introduced and equipped to carry out the service. The professional staffs are essentially 'holding hands' of the junior staff as they help them navigate the deep and turbulent waters during the early days of implementing the service.

Conclusion

Subject Librarianship at HIT opens up new horizons and new opportunities in knowledge and information provision at HIT. It is meant to attain stakeholder satisfaction through reaching out and providing access to content right at the doorstep of faculty and students. The Subject Librarians will ensure that the contents in the one-stop shop are not preserved for posterity on the Library shelves but are made known for effective and optimum utilisation to stimulate scholarship in innovation by students and staff at HIT. The Subject Librarians are your link persons and focal-point men and women at your service. The HIT user community is thus being encouraged to work with them.
